The school has adopted the RE syllabus produced by the Lichfield Diocesan Board of Education and the scheme ‘Understanding Christianity’. In line with the Diocesan guidelines, RE is allocated 7% of curriculum time.

Within that, the balance of time allocated to Christianity is 70% and to other faiths 30%. If appropriate, the non-Christian faiths should be drawn on when studying the syllabus units to develop and deepen understanding. This will also help to keep the balance of time spent on non-Christian faiths while following all the units of the Diocesan syllabus.

Appreciating the different faiths of children attending the school and that of the community, the other faiths studied will be Islam, Hinduism, Sikhism, Judaism and Buddhism as well as World Views.

Elements of the RE syllabus may be re-enforced through Collective Worship within the school, (reference being made to the Collective Worship Policy). Particular attention should be made to celebrate festivals from all the religions studied within Collective Worship.

Links with St Mary’s Church are fostered and, where appropriate, there are opportunities to develop relationships with holy places of other denominations and faiths in the community.

Responsibility for the policy

The management of RE is a distinctive role of the Governors and Headteacher.

The policy has been written in consultation with the staff of the school following Diocesan guidelines and approved by the Governing body. It is to be reviewed every 2 years by the RE co-ordinator before being presented to staff and Governors.

The RE co-ordinator is responsible for implementation/co-ordination of the policy.

Legal Requirement

We are a Church of England school. In line with the schools trust deeds, the terms of Union with the National Society state with regard to religious education that: The Head teacher and the governing body will ensure that religious education is given at least five per cent of curriculum time and that such religious education is consistent with the faith and practice of the Church.

At Windsor Park, 7% of the curriculum time is dedicated to Religious Education.

Statement of aims

According to 'Deeply Christian, Serving the Common Good' the vision for education is 'deeply Christian, with the promise by Jesus of 'life in all its fullness' at its heart'. We strongly agree with this statement and are committed to ensuring that 'the deeply Christian foundation for this vision will be seen explicitly in teaching and learning both in RE and across the curriculum, and also in the authentically Christian worship and ethos'.

At Windsor Park Middle School, we believe in teaching R.E. so children are able to discover more about themselves, others and God. We encourage children's values and spiritual development to be explored and experienced throughout the whole school.

"In Church of England schools the students and their families can expect a religious education curriculum that is rich and varied, enabling learners to acquire a thorough knowledge and understanding of the Christian faith. Church schools should provide a wide range of opportunities for learners to understand and to make links between the beliefs, practices and value systems of the range of faiths and world views studied."

Church schools should use some form of enquiry approach that engages with, for example biblical text, and helps develop religious and theological literacy. Links with the Christian values of the school and spiritual, moral, social and cultural development are intrinsic to the RE curriculum and should have a significant impact on learners."

At Windsor Park Middle School, Religious Education & Religious Literacy should

- Nurture pupils own personal faith/commitment within a clear ethos of respect for those children of the faiths.
- Contribute to pupils' personal development including spiritual, moral, social and cultural development, with reference to the school PSHE policy and curriculum.
- Give pupils a sound knowledge and understanding of the Christian faith.
- Give pupils the opportunity to explore the nature of religious language and symbolism.
- Value pupils' own faith and introduce them to other world faiths
- Experience Christian faith and places of worship.

Our Intent statement

'Preparing for life as respectful, religiously literate citizens within today's diverse and plural society'. As a Church of England school we are an inclusive community. We aim to foster a well-established and growing knowledge and understanding of beliefs, practices, spiritual insights and secular world views through reading a variety of religious texts and stories. We develop a deep respect for the integrity of other religions, traditions and views and for the religious freedom of each and every person. There are opportunities for pupils to understand the role of foundational texts, beliefs, rituals, and practices and how they help form identity.

Our pupils acquire a rich, deep knowledge and understanding of Christian belief and practice, and Christianity as a living world faith through an exploration of core theological concepts and questions that critically engage with biblical text.

Content and approach

The Christian element of the RE curriculum will be based on the objectives within the Lichfield Diocesan syllabus along with Understanding Christianity and the teaching activities and resources recommended. The yearly themes to be taught will follow the Diocesan agreed syllabus and the units covered within each term will follow the curriculum overview given by subject leader. Religious Education has developed into two parts at Windsor Park; 'Religious Education: Beliefs and Values' and 'Religious Literacy'.

RE:BV will be taught by RE subject specialist teachers, Religious Literacy will be taught by members of the English faculty, exploring the culture and history of the religion concurrently being taught in RE:BV and reading texts which relate to the RE:BV theme.

Progression and Monitoring

RE will be monitored by the co-ordinator on a termly cycle and with reference to the school improvement plan. To monitor standards and progression throughout the school, records will be kept according to the Diocesan guidance and the school Teaching, Learning and Assessment Policy.

Special Education Needs provision

Teachers will plan activities according to the needs and abilities within the class, differentiation for the more able and the less able appropriately. The needs of children on the SEN register will be accounted for and appropriate to their PLPs, with reference to the SEN policy.

Assessment

Teachers will assess RE with reference to the assessment and the feedback policies. Parents will be informed on their child's progress at regular parent evenings and a written report given at the end of the year as part of the child's annual written report. Pupils are informed termly of their progress towards their target, this is recorded in their books. The children's work will be assessed against a scale, focussing on key skills to be taught within each unit. These are: exploring the text, discovering the impact, making a connection and diving deeper.

Resources

Appropriate resources will be ordered and collated by the co-ordinator, building on the bank of resources already held by the department.
